

# KYC'S CAPACITY BUILDING PROGRESS By Esther Kyazike Ginda, KYC CEO

In a bid to strengthen the capacity of KYC, there have been a number of capacity building interventions since 2014 with support from Mirembe Foundation through Gaipronj Business Solutions (GBS), a consultancy firm. In the first quarter of 2015, KYC finalized its 3 year strategic plan, recruited staff and expanded membership of its board from a 3- person active board to 7. The new board has been inducted in its function.

In addition, KYC acquired a vehicle to purposely support the mobile library service that is, to transport books and staff to and from the partner schools and to monitor the project activities. The vehicle will also be used for other organizational errands. KYC also acquired new books to update and increase educational resources within the Mobile Library Service.

KYC is yet to implement the use of ICT in enhancing classroom instruction through conducting teachers' workshops and setting up a pilot ICT facility in 3 primary schools that will each receive a computer, printer and modem. This is aimed stimulating teachers' interest to access technology and enhance the capacity to do research and access educational resources and to also create online linkages that will promote further library support to schools. An organization's ability to learn, and translate that learning into action rapidly, is the ultimate competitive advantage. Jack Welch

## LIBRARY NEWS: Academic story

### Drop Everything And Read (DEAR) day, 5<sup>th</sup> March 2015

In an effort to promote reading culture and love of learning on a national scale, KYC joined other stakeholders to implement DEAR Day activities. The vision of the DEAR day is to organise every year and implement activities at 11.00am on the specific day to have everyone in schools or community organizations across Uganda put down what they are doing and engage in reading.

KYC mobilised 2 schools, Exodus primary school and Kilokole primary school, to participate in the day's activities. 158 children ranging from 8 − 14years participated in the activities. ■

### Community reading tent, $2^{nd} - 3^{rd}$ April 2015

KYC held a 2 day community reading tent in cooperation with Kampala Library and Information Center (KLIC) from. The purpose of the activity was to sensitize the community in Kawempe Division about reading and to promote both KLIC and KYC as library information service providers. The activity engaged 20 primary schools strictly from Kawempe Division for the two days from which 20 pupils from P.3 to P.7 from each school were nominated to participate in the activities.

One of the primary school, Ttula C/U primary school, was nominated by KLIC to establish a functional school library. It received a donation of books worth 1,919,000= from Kampala Capital City Authority (KCCA) as a contribution to the starter library collection. In addition, KLIC will isolate that school library as a model school library in Kawempe Division for other schools to emulate. KYC will give technical support in setting up the school library.

KYC has also supported me with school fees through Pearl of Africa, to which I am truly grateful.
