As a result of the current global economic crisis, more and more youth are looking to be their own bosses. Fortunately, young people are not alone in their entrepreneurial pursuits. All over Uganda, there are agencies and organizations that are dedicated to equipping youth with the knowledge and skills needed to be productive and successful members of communities. In 2012, KYC won an Electronic Information For Libraries (EIFL) award for improving the economic wellbeing of young people.

In May 2015, KYC was privileged to host Ronnie Dunetz, a

Senior Business and Life Coach, Founder of "Dunetz for Entrepreneurs", from Israel to facilitate a 4 days youth workshop intended to coach and empower young entrepreneurs. This is the 5th time that KYC organized such workshops, 4 of them being done in partnership with other institutions such as Banks and other institutions that work to empower young people.

During the course of the workshop the participants engaged in an array of tools and exercises to bring about the stated goals. Participants were inspired to think "outside the box"

and see potential instead of limitations, develop a vision of where they wish to be, develop a focused plan, learn how to use "business storytelling" to engage, motivate, convince and persuade others, among other topics!

The feedback results of the workshop were heart-warming and fulfilling. Out of the 55 participants that attended the 4 days' workshop, over 90% cited that they gained professional tools that they will make use of in the future, found the content relevant to them, and cited that their interest in entrepreneurship increased!

KYC plans to continue to engage young people in such empowerment activities to contribute to their development. "It is never too late to be what you might have been. (George Eliot)" ■

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Social Business Acceleration for KYC; Libraries Gone Social by Tim Walsh, KYC ICT Facilitator

On May 29th 2015, KYC won an opportunity to be part of a wider global community of Yunus Social Business (YSB) that seeks to transform the way business is conducted in the 21st century. From more than 10 libraries that competed in this year's YSB Uganda accelerator program, KYC emerged among the five libraries that were selected as a special interest group among fifteen social businesses which are the first cohort for YSB, in Uganda and in Sub Saharan Africa. Along with; Bwera Information Centre, Kitengesa Community Library, Nambi Ssepuuya Library and Uganda Development Services, the 5 libraries joined 10 other

social businesses to go through a 10 week accelerator program designed to provide enterprise support to initiatives within each social enterprise.

KYC is now part of a community of over 100 social businesses worldwide and have received Coaching and mentoring from top international and local experts.

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On July 27th 2015, KYC was privileged to attend the social 2 private schools and 2 community libraries among which business conference that was held in Kampala at Sheraton Hotel-Rwenzori Ball Room where we had presentations



from key note speakers among who was Nobel Laureate Professor Yunus Muhammed who is also the founder of Grameen Bank-Bangladesh. We are glad to directing our work be

towards meeting community need through ways that are; innovative and sustainable.

In August, KCCA organised a school librarians workshop which was attended by approximately 3/4 of public schools, was KYC.

The work was intended to equip teacher/school librarians with basic library operations skills and ways in which they can put up creative activities to encourage children to visit the school libraries and to also promote reading in schools.

Schools were also encouraged to participate in theme days such as the DEAR day, Book week and World Read Aloud day among others.

KYC works with 18 schools under the mobile library service; and we have been involving them to actively participate in these theme days.

Previously, the Kawempe Church of Uganda school library in Kilokole, Kawempe served as a store and a library at the same time. Some new books were in boxes without stamps; pieces of old furniture, jerry cans and boxes among

others laid idly on the floor, in fact, one had to jump over them in order to access book shelves. And the library was out of bounds to the children because of fear that they might lose and misplace the books. This library was revamped by

KYC team through her partnership with KCCA. And now the library looks likes a LIBRARY.

The shelves are now clearly marked enable both to teachers and children easily access the books. The school is interested in becoming a

mobile library partner. KYC has continued to receive requests from schools to help them set school libraries and train their teachers on how to manage book stock.

volunteering at KYC as a library attendant. I was anxious to join university; unfortunately I was unable to, due to inadequate funds. Fortunately, KAMPABITS, one of KYC's partners recruited students for their certificate courses in Information Technology for the

2015-2016 intake. Only 80 slots were available and I was one of the students who successfully passed the interviews out of 150 students. Students are required to pay a fee of 400,000 shs for the whole program. Subjects taught include ICT for Youth Employability, Computer Repair and Maintenance, Entrepreneurship, Life skills, Web Development and Graphics Design. All these subjects are very practical meeting the current employment standards.

Despite the fact that I do not have parents to pay my fees, I am fortunate that KYC will support me with the tuition payments, and the allowance I get from volunteering at the centre meets my other needs including transport to and from school. *Am now on my way to becoming a computer Guru*.

I was able to apply the theoretical skills that I had long accumulated from school to practice: Document classification, cataloging, and other daily library routine, training teachers on ICTs and setting up school libraries in communities among other activities.
