

# SEECHILD's ANNUAL REPORT 2019

Activity Report 1st January 2019 to 31st December 2019

**Sustainable and Effective Empowerment** of Children with Disabilities (SEECHILD) is a Social Enterprise mandated to work with children with special needs. The **Enterprise launched her programs in 2018** at Bunamwaya Ngobe zone B, Wakiso District in Uganda, where her head office is located. The management started a Skills Training Centre for children with special needs called **Bunamwaya Intergrated Skills Training Centre (BISTC).** The organization also acquired some land in Mpigi, where she is constructing an **Organized Centre where effective skilling** for children from distant areas will take place. The management takes pleasure to introduce to you the detailed report of activities that transpired in the year 2019.

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#### SEECHILD's Annual Report 2019:

#### **Preamble:**

Educating children with disabilities requires much more than imparting skills in them but going an extra mile to understand, accept, and lovingly help them to overcome the negative psychological impact of their disabilities so that individually they are helped to exploit their talents. The talents and abilities embedded in these children are quite many but usually hidden from us because of our wrong perceptions and biases other people have about them.

For any teacher or trainer to get the best out of them, one needs patience, one to one interaction, and continuous practice of a particular behavior one needs them to adapt.

This means that their learning environment needs to be more facilitated than that of other children. The syllabuses their trainers and teachers follow should not be over crowded with theoretical work but practical information which can easily be turned into hands on experience.

SEECHILD is very grateful to all her donors most especially Mirembe foundation, Wereld Missie Hulp, Tusaidiane and others for helping them to facilitate SEECHILD's projects / programs that have made 2019 a year of progressive achievements.

#### Background:

**Sustainable and Effective Empowerment of Children with Disabilities (SEECHILD)** registered as a company limited by guarantee is a non-profit making Organization mandated to work with children with Disabilities. It has its head office in Bunamwaya Central, Mutundwe Parish in Wakiso District.

**Mission:** To empower families and children with disabilities through awareness raising, advocacy, skills training and research.

Vision: Celebrating a skillful and healthy people with disabilities.

Motto: Skilling disarms Disabilities.

#### **Objectives of the Organization:**

- 1. Help Parents understand and handle well their children with disabilities.
- 2. Ensure that the communities become vigilant to eradicate stigma and bias which usually culminate in unfair treatment of children living with disabilities.
- 3. Run skills training centers for children and parents.
- 4. Promote awareness of children's various disabilities and their marginalization in communities.
- 5. Create avenues for financial empowerment of families, Organizations and programs with such children.
- 6. Run day and boarding care centers for children with special needs.
- 7. Work with various government and organizations to influence policy in order to create conducive environment for children with disabilities.

- 8. Participate in programs, activities that promote or support the realization of the above mentioned objectives.
- 9. Promote research development and innovation for solutions of the problems affecting children with disabilities.

Historical facts of the organization:

SEECHILD came into existence after four people led by Fred Kirigwajjo Matovu realized a big gap in education system in our communities where Children with disabilities are greatly marginalized and left out as far as their skilling is concerned. There are neither adequate educational infrastructures nor accessible formal education opportunities availed to them in our communities.

In order to establish facts of this problem, SEECHILD being helped by Mirembe Foundation carried out a base line survey around Bunamwaya town in 2017. The findings were alarming. In an area of 9Kms by diameter there was no operational training Centre availed for children with disabilities. However over 165 children with disabilities were registered in the area. All of these children were left at home sometimes behind locked doors while their siblings went for school classes.

This situation was not only traumatizing to the children but also a painful choice for the parents. The government of Uganda promotes integration education system where by children with disabilities are encouraged to study with other children who have no disabilities.

This system would be very effective for children with mild disabilities, however, it also implies the availability of technical personnel to handle such children with special needs which is currently not the case in many schools.

#### Bunamwaya Integrated Skills Training Centre BISTC:

SEECHILD started Bunamwaya Integrated Skills Training Centre (BISTC) in 2018, to bridge this gap and offer opportunity, to children with special needs to have an education Centre, where they can get the basic skills they need in life for self - sustenance. With the two years BISTC has been operational, a lot has been achieved and children are finding it a very conducive learning environment though a lot is still desired.

#### The objectives of setting up this Centre were as follows:

- 1. To avail affordable qualitative basic skills training opportunities to children with special needs.
- 2. To inculcate in parents a culture of educating children with special needs other than denying them their right to education.
- 3. To sensitize the community about the rights of children with disabilities hence eradicating the negative bias the community holds about these children.
- 4. To provide marketable vocational and daily living skills that can enable these children to be selfsustaining or less dependent in case of severe disabilities in their Adult age.

#### Activities:

#### **Departmental Reports:**

#### Music Dance & Dramma:

Music dance and drama is taken as an important activity on the day's program at BISTC. Its supremacy lies in its function of enabling trainees to relax and concentrate. We thank our donors Mirembe Foundation who injected some money this year to acquire musical instruments. A total of ten million has enabled us to buy a public address system with 4 micro-phones, a piano, a base guitar, 6 flutes and xylophone. This, in addition to what we had already acquired is making this department well facilitated.

So far, we have not yet got a trained music director who can help these children to get serious music skills, however the department head together with other staff have been taking children through dance drills. The speech day presentation, made many people aware and amazed of the potential these children have, when they saw their organized performance.

#### **Dancing:**

This involved traditional / cultural, local and international dances;

Traditional/cultural dance. The best pupils were; Faith, Renitah and Elvis, those who tried were Kasawe, Edward, Belinda, Andrew and those who had little interest were; Miiro, Martin, Vianney, Grace, Kirabo, Sarah and Joash. Douglas, Afran and Zziwa tried but with difficult because of their physical disabilities.



International and local dances; this is the most liked category of dance where most of the trainees participated. This kind of music is played on local television and radio stations in their homes; The following was their performance starting from the best to the least performance: Phillip, Renitah, Belinda Faith, Elvis, Edward, Allan, Miiro, Vianney, Martin, Douglas and those who performed poorly were; Sarah, Joash, Kirabo

# Singing

This involves hits and common songs or played popular songs both gospel, local and international. The songs are collected and played at the Centre. Trainees are also encouraged to sing their own songs or those composed by the trainer. The best trainees were Zziwa followed by Grace, Edward and Belinda. The rest couldn't because of their disabilities

# Miming and rapping

All trainees liked using microphones and miming. The best trainees were; Zziwa, Edward, Grace, Miiro, Martin, Vianney and Faith some trainees can clam some songs and mime them like Edward, Grace, Belinda Miiro and Zziwa.

**Playing guitar;** we have not started seriously training children in this category because the trainer doesn't know how to play it.

# Drumming

This category hasn't been tackled well because the trainer is still learning how to drum. But nevertheless, trainees like Douglas and Martin have exhibited much interest in drumming than the rest.

#### Achievements;

- The trainees performed well and entertained spectators on awareness day at Lugogo, parents' days and the speech day at BISTC.
- Children's self-esteem and team work spirit has been boosted.
- Some trainees like Ignatius have exhibited interest in music and can easily take it on as a skill in case we get a skilled trainer.
- We received the following items; Key board, public address system, micro phones, xylophone, a flash disk, adapter and battery cells for the microphone and the remote etc.

# **Challenges:**

The TV set we have got a mechanical problem towards the end of the year.

We need a DVD player to help in training.

## Way forward suggestions:

Music being an essential part of the training requires both skilled and leisure training. The management should seriously consider getting a music trainer.

# Literacy or communication skills training:

This involves equipping children with writing, sign language and reading skills.

# **Vocational Skilling:**

This year, trainees have made significant improvements in tailoring. Even those with severe disabilities. Many surprised parents and other people who attended the speech day when they saw how neatly they mended the torn clothes which were given to them as a test.

# Weaving Mats:

Palm mats weaving is one of the home traditional domestic activity which produces sizeable income for home mothers. Nowadays, the business is becoming very lucrative because mats are very marketable especially in craft shops. The weaving is also very helpful to children with disabilities as it helps them to concentrate. At BISTC, trainees have learnt very well to make mats. This activity helps them to become self-sustaining as they can easily get income with a small capital.

#### Sweater knitting:

BISTC got machines for Sweater knitting but no staff knew how to use them. During this period three staff members have been trained to make sweaters. The staff have already made sweaters for the trainees and next year they will seriously teach the children how to use the machines.

# **Book making:**

Some staff have also been trained to make books and have actually made some. However these skills have not yet been imparted to children.

# Self Help Skills of Daily Living:

Self-help skills involves bathing, brushing teeth, and washing clothes after classes. Two days were selected in a week for washing i.e. Tuesday and Thursday.

#### **Case Reporting by Sharon:**

Kirabo Ssannyu is one of the mental disorder cases in the second group. The mother brought her at BISTC complaining that Kirabo was actually a problem at home. She was not only violent but very destructive. She could not stay peaceful with her colleagues, she used to throw stones at any person she felt was a threat to her, uprooted all plants she could see. This trainee knew nothing at all even holding a cup was a problem. Going to the toilet was also another problem. She could eat on her own but after eating she could just throw the cups or plates where ever she liked. Bathing was also another problem. She didn't know even how to hold a sponge, the same applied to brushing and washing.

When the staff assessed her, we recommended her to go to Butabika (the main psychiatric hospital in Uganda ) to see the doctors. The doctors recommended a therapy and also advised the parents to put her in an environment where she can be accepted.

The first time, Kirabo was admitted at BISTC, she uprooted all the plants and threw stones at people whom she never liked. But with time Kirabo has learnt to stay peacefully with people. She can now eat well, take plates where they are supposed to be, clean them with guidance from the trainers and concentrate in a class for at least some 20 to 30 minutes.

#### Wheel Chair donation from Mission for disability:

During 2018, BISTC received many children who came at the Centre with mobility limitations and needed wheel chairs. SEECHILD made a project to another organization called Mission for Disabilities which gave us 10 new wheel chairs. So far 5 wheels chairs have been supplied to children from the community.

# **Outreaching Program / projects;**

#### Mental disorders:

This project involved finding people with mental problems from the community and support them to start medical therapy to contain the problem.

SEECHILD organized meetings for parents and care takers to counsel them for accepting to administer the therapy. In addition SEECHILD supported them to take them to Butabika hospital to receive the drugs.

#### NB.

- 1. Very Severe is intended to describe worst condition where a patient is constantly unconscious with lunatic symptoms (sometimes violent) which puts his /her life or other people's lives at a risk.
- 2. **Severe** is intended to describe a condition where a patient exhibits visible symptoms of lunatic behaviors but somehow controllable (sometimes on and off).
- 3. **Mild condition** this is where a patient has some symptoms of lunatic behavior but can allow him or her to function with less supervision.
- 4. **Contained** means the condition is under control and constant for a patient to manage normal behaviors.
- 5. It must be noted that **BI-polar** condition is not curable only controlled with drugs. Relapses are also expected so that is why we need the full participation of the family and guardians.

We have amazing successes for all those who have been taking their drugs on regular basis. One of them is David Mugema, who is about forty five years old. For over 20 years, David has been eating from the garbage on the streets of Kampala and sleeping where ever nights found him. He was always walking naked along the streets and very often bruised because of being beaten by by-passers.

We approached his step mum Mrs. Mugerwa and she accepted to take Mugema for medication to Butabika hospital. We offered transport and helped her with the cost of drugs.

David no longer sleeps outside. He sleeps home in his small room, eats from home and attends functions with other people without noticing that he has a mental disorder.

He attended our speech day function but many people could not believe that he is the other David who used to walk along Kampala streets very dirty, other times naked with piles of garbage around him.

# **Staff Training and Empowerment:**

# 1. First Aid Training for the Staff:

# **First Aid Training:**

**Trainees:** All the staff of BISTC apart from the Social Worker who was in her maternity leave. 10 staff members attended the training.

# **Content of the training:**

- 1. Handling unconscious cases example: (epileptic, heart attack, accident cases etc.)
- 2. Handling broken limbs, injuries and bleeding wounds.
- 3. Handling Burns and scalds.
- 4. Handling cases of poisoning.
- 5. Handling electrocuted cases.
- 6. Handling choked cases.

The above package was given in a full two days training by trainers from Red Cross at a standard cost of 2,500,000/=. This cost involved the training and issuing each trainee with a certificate. The Red Cross also gave us an internet application which describe the details of handling these cases in case they do happen.

The training was introduced with a brief from the leader of the trainers Mr. Miti Lwanga. This one never participated in the actual training. He left us with the three trainers namely: Isaac Kimbugwe, Angella and Christopher Bbosa.

After the brief, trainees were given a questioner with questions which were answered individually and marked to assess their level of understanding issues concerning the first aid. From there actual training followed involving brief introductions of the cases and actual demonstrations from the trainers followed of how to handle such case.

All trainees were given ample time to practice both on the dummies and their fellow trainees. The training ended with an exam which was used to grade the trainees for certificate award. Certificates were given out afterwards.

#### 2. Monthly Staff recollections and meetings:

It's very essential for staff to be motivated and with the positive spiritual positioning to give such service to children with disabilities. At BISTC, we organize monthly recollections and staff meetings. The monthly recollections are given by out siders namely our Parish Priest, lay counsellors and other people. These talk to staff with words of hope and encourage them to give their service with no reservations because it a noble work. Regularly, we organize spiritual services namely: Mass cerebrations, bible studies etc.

#### Netting working:

SEECHILD as an Organization is now a full member of **Special Children's Forum** a platform that brings together organizations that work with children with special needs. This forum was started with an objective of giving more bargaining powers to member organizations so that their service become more effective and sustainable.

Members of this Forum meet twice per year at premises of any member Organization to discuss issues pertaining to their work. In February the Forum will hold her meeting at BISTC. The forum is planning to organize basket fundraising and advocacy programs to enable her members be more facilitated.

#### **Training opportunities for the Parents:**

At BISTC, Skills training of the children is made concurrently with parents' skills training. This is to enable parents / guardians acquire good parenting skills to execute their duty well. Another reason is to enable them to accept their children as special gifts without regrets. We do this by giving them special training during holidays and involving them in special children's functions namely awareness programs and tours where they have opportunities of seeing children doing things by themselves. During these functions they get opportunity of seeing what their children are capable of doing and also interacting with other children with special needs.

# **Special Functions cerebrated during The Year:**

Awareness raising day: It took place at Lugogo on 12 July. It was organized by special children trust whereby different organizations dealing with children with disabilities come to share ideas.

This was one of the last activities we did towards the end of the year. It involved taking children, all staff and some of the parents to the airport and the zoo. Children, parents and staff enjoyed the day.

In order to make it impressive, we invited the minister of primary education and the Member of Parliament of the area. We also invited many other dignitaries from around.

This day was organized with the following objectives:

- Advertise BISTC as a skills training Centre for children with disabilities.
- Fundraise for the activities.
- Present appreciation certificates to all our donors and people who have helped us to offer this noble service to our people.

We sent letters to all stake holders and guests almost two months before the day. All preparations went on well. However, on the day, rain started in the morning and as our road is being constructed, almost all the main invited guests never turned up. Other guests came and we went on with the presentations.

#### Achievements:

- 1. All children who reported for the training are doing well and parents have identified great change.
- 2. Some learners have acquired serious vocation skills like tailoring, knitting and weaving
- 3. We have managed to have a workshop for parents and guardians at the Centre where they have got the relevancy of training children with disabilities.
- 4. First Aid training for staff members was given and staff are now more equipped with emergency skills.
- 5. We started the payment of NSSF with effect from May, 2019 (National social security fund).

#### **PROBLEMS:**

- Poor payment of school fees by parents affects the children's diet and some other programs to be facilitated.
- Lack of enough space in class rooms
- Lack of school van limits the number of learners

#### WAYFORWARD:

• Look for sponsorship for learners.

- Acquire a school van for the learners.
- Complete the new building to avail more space.
- Speech days will be organized at the end of the second term to avoid competition.
- BISTC shall seriously start income generating projects to facilitate her activities in addition to fees payment and sponsorship.
